

A Brief Review Of the Books Of the Old Testament

The Bible is made up of 66 Books 39 Books in the OT 27 Books in the NT One Division of OT Books, based on the arrangement of books in our English Bibles: **LAW**: Genesis-Deuteronomy (5 Books) **HISTORY**: Joshua-Esther (**12** Books) **POETRY/WISDOM**: Job-Songs (5 Books) **MAJOR PROPHETS**: Isaiah-Daniel (5 Books) MINOR PROPHETS: Hosea-Malachi (12 Books)

(Note that there are other ways to divide the OT)

WHY STUDY THE OT?

The Bible is progressive revelation

- The NT is built upon what is written in the OT
- For example--to Gain knowledge of Jewish Customs mentioned in NT
- The identity of the Messiah etc.
- To gain understanding of many prophecies—detailed prophecies of the rise and fall of nations, end-times etc.
- Jesus loved and quoted the OT
- It makes us wise unto salvation
 - 2 Tim 3: 15—Sacred writings are able to make you wise unto salvation

It is through its examples, for our instruction, to provide encouragement, instill hope and generate endurance

- Romans 15: 4 —whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction that through endurance and through encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope
- <u>**1 Cor. 10: 11</u>** —these things happened to them (people of the OT) as **example**, but they were <u>written down for our instruction</u>, on whom the end of the ages has come</u>

WHY STUDY THE OT?

- The OT gives the basis of all of the lasting institutions known to humanity:
 - Origins of the earth, humanity, races, marriage, education, music, law, kingdoms, wars, sin, salvation, God's sovereignty, grace etc.
 It points to Christ
 - **John 5: 39**—the Scriptures bear witness of Me (Christ)
 - Luke 24: 44—"these are my words that I spoke to you, while I was still with you, that everything written about Me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms might be fulfilled."

The OT Scriptures are RELIABLE and TRUE:

John 10: 35—Scriptures cannot be broken

<u>**2 Tim 3: 16</u>**—<u>**ALL SCRIPTURE**</u> is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, reproof, correction and training in righteousness</u>

<u>2 Peter 1: 21</u>—no prophecy was ever produced by the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit.

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
Some Interpretive Mistakes To Avoid when studying OT (or NT) Narrative record:

- Note that approximately 40% of the OT is narrative and most of the narrative record is in the 12 Historical books.
- Remember that these are <u>NOT</u> simply stories but illustrate the WORK OF GOD through people—GOD IS THE HERO.
 - The OT highlights the Work of the Triune God in the FATHER
 - The Gospels highlight the Work of the Triune God in the SON
 - The Book of Acts and the Epistles highlight the Work of the Triune God in the HOLY SPIRIT
 - These are **NOT** allegories which teach mysterious truths
 - Every story may **NOT** contain a lesson or moral
 - One should <u>NOT</u> attempt to formulate DOCTRINAL PROPOSITIONS based <u>SOLELY</u> on narrative.

HOW NARRATIVE HELPS OUR UNDERSTANDING:


Every individual account is like the pieces of a puzzle which when joined to other pieces presents the BIG PICTURE

Some Reasons For The Captivity

THE WRATH OF GOD (Lev. 25: 4; Numbers 35: 33; Psalm 106: 34-43; Ezekiel 22; 2 Kings 24: 1-4; 2 Chronicles 36: 21: Jeremiah 20: 1-6 and many more)

- Israel & Judah rejected the Lord
- They rejected his laws
- They profaned his Sabbaths
- They profaned the land by their idolatries
- They shed innocent blood
- They acted fraudulently in finances
- They dishonored their parents
- They listened to false prophets

THE MERCY OF GOD (READ EZRA chapter 9; Psalm 106: 44-48; Ezekiel 36 and many more)

The Lord's concern for His NAME prompted the RETURN

The Lord was saving a remnant (e.g. Joseph—Gen 45: 7; also the idea of remnant in the Assyrian Invasion 2 Kings 19: 29-31)

- NOTE THESE PROPECIES:
- Leviticus 26: 32-33; 44 (written as early as 1400 BC)
- Isaiah 49: 13-17 (written between 701-681 BC)
- Jeremiah 32: 36-37 (626-586 BC)
- Ezekiel 34: 13 (593-571 BC)

POLITICAL REASON: The Fertile Crescent

PRECURSORS OF THE EXILE

- JOSHUA— THE VICTORY OF FAITH
 - Joshua executes what Moses began
 - Moses vision becomes Joshua's venture
 - Fulfillment of land promises made to Abraham
 - "So Joshua took the whole land" (Josh. 11: 23)
 - From death of Moses in 1407 BC (Joshua aged 90)
 - To end of the United Effort in 1400 BC (Joshua aged 97)
 - "There remains yet very much land to be possessed" (Josh. 13: 1)

13 years later Joshua dies at the age of 110
 "Israel served Yahweh, all the days of Joshua and all the days of the elders..." (Josh 24: 31)

7 years later the elders die in 1380 BC

JUDGES—CRIES OF DESPAIR

- 12 leaders appointed by God to lead Israel in emergency situation (only 12 are mentioned but there were more judges)
- They had no power to MAKE laws nor INTERPRET Laws. They were to UPHOLD (enforce) the Law and thus bring "rest" to the land
 - God gave the Law, the Priests interpreted the law. The judges had to enforce the law.
- The Conquest at the time of Joshua gave way to toleration, accommodation and assimilation
 - Possession of the land gives way to oppression within the land Freedom gives way to bondage and regression
 - The victory of Faith gives way to the bondage of the Flesh
 - "EVERY man did what was right in his own eyes" (twice mentioned)
 - **"The children of Israel did evil in the sight of Yahweh** (7 times mentioned)
 - Cycle of **Rebellion**, **Retribution**, **Repentance**, **Redemption** and **Rest** but continuously down the slippery slope. (each cycle was a plunge downward, not upward, nor horizontal)

THE MONARCHS DID NOT FAIR MUCH BETTER

- Israel's desire for a king— "appoint for us a king to judge us like all the nations." (1 Sam. 8: 5)
- Note that the issue was not in their desire for a king but in their rejection of the true KING— "And the LORD said to Samuel..."Obey the voice of the people in all that they say to you, for they have not rejected you, but they have rejected me from being king over them." (1 Sam 8: 7)

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Some of Solomon's sins:--led to the division of Israel into North and South

HORSES

"Solomon also had 40,000 stalls of horses for his chariots, and 12,000 horsemen" (1 Kings 4: 26)

WIVES

- 700 wives and 300 concubines (1 Kings 11:3)
- He loved many foreign women—Egyptian, Moabite, Ammonite, Edomite, Sidonian, and Hittite (1 Kings 11: 1)
- His wives "turned his heart after other gods" (1 Kings 11: 4)

WEALTH

"the weight of gold that came to Solomon in one year was 666 talents of gold" (1 Kings 10: 14)

IDOLATRY

"Solomon went after Ashtoreth the goddess of the Sidonians, and after Milcom the abomination of the Ammonites. So Solomon did what was evil in the sight of the LORD" (1 Kings 11: 5-6)

RESULT: DIVISION

"And the LORD was angry with Solomon, because his heart had turned away from the LORD, the God of Israel, who had appeared to him twice ... Therefore the LORD said to Solomon, "Since this has been your practice and you have not kept my covenant and my statutes that I have commanded you, I will surely <u>tear the kingdom</u> <u>from you</u> and will give it to your servant." (2 Kings 11: 9)


Assyrian Invasion and Dispersion of the Northern Tribes

- 2Ki 15:29 In the days of Pekah king of Israel, Tiglathpileser king of Assyria came and captured Ijon, Abelbeth-maacah, Janoah, Kedesh, Hazor, Gilead, and Galilee, all the land of Naphtali, and he carried the people captive to Assyria.
 - 2Ki 16:10 When King Ahaz went to Damascus to meet Tiglath-pileser king of Assyria, he saw the altar that was at Damascus. And King Ahaz sent to Uriah the priest a model of the altar, and its pattern, exact in all its details.

JUDAH'S BABYLONIAN CAPTIVITY--Nebuchadnezzar

- 3 Waves of Exiles
- Daniel and others—605 BC
- 10,00 captives including prophet Ezekiel (597 BC)
- Siege and Destruction of Jerusalem (586 BC)
- End of Captivity celebrated by Feast Of Tabernacles in Jerusalem (536 BC) [Ezra 3:4]
- 605-536 = ~ 70 years

JUDAH'S BABYLONIAN CAPTIVITY--Nebuchadnezzar

HEZEKIAH—illness and recovery (**2 Kings 20**) King of Babylon (Meroduk-Baladan) visits Hezekiah (2 Kings 20: 12) Hezekiah shows the Babylonians "all his treasure house, the silver, the gold, the spices, the precious oil, his armory, all that was found in his storehouses. There was nothing in his house or in all his realm that Hezekiah did not show them." Then Isaiah the prophet came to King Hezekiah, and said to him, "What did these men say? And from where did they come to you?" And Hezekiah said, "They have come from a far country, from Babylon." He said, "What have they seen in your house?" And Hezekiah answered, "They have seen all that is in my house; there is nothing in my storehouses that I did not show them." Then Isaiah said to Hezekiah, "Hear the word of the LORD: Behold, the days are coming, when all that is in your house, and that which your fathers have stored up till this day, shall be carried to Babylon. Nothing shall be left, says the LORD. And some of your own sons, who shall be born to you, shall be taken away, and they shall be eunuchs in the palace of the king of Babylon."



In his days, Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon came up, and Jehoiakim became his servant three years. Then he turned and rebelled against him.

And the LORD sent against him bands of the Chaldeans and bands of the Syrians and bands of the Moabites and bands of the Ammonites, and sent them against Judah to destroy it, according to the word of the LORD that he spoke by his servants the prophets.

Surely this came upon Judah at the command of the LORD, to remove them out of his sight, for the sins of Manasseh, according to all that he had done,

and also for the **innocent blood that he had shed**. For he filled Jerusalem with innocent blood, **and the LORD would not pardon**.
